



Herbert Zech studied Law at the Universities of Erlangen and Munich. After his bar exam (second state exam) at the Munich Court of Appeal he obtained his doctorate degree (Dr. jur.) at the University of Constance. After working as an attorney in the field of Tax and Company Law at Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer's Munich office for one year he went to Kaiserslautern University of Technology where he studied Biology and also worked as an assistant researcher at the Chair of Private and Economic Law. Since 2007, Herbert Zech was a non-tenured Senior Lecturer (Akademischer Rat auf Zeit) at the University of Bayreuth working with Prof. Dr. Ansgar Ohly, LL.M. In the fall semester 2011/2012 he became an Interim Professor heading the Chair of Civil Law, Economic Law and Technology Law in Bayreuth. He also received the *venia legendi* for Civil Law, Commercial and Company Law, Intellectual Property Law, Competition Law and Technology Law. His postdoctoral thesis focused on "Information as an Object of Property Rights". From April 2012 until March 2019 Herbert Zech was a professor at the Faculty of Law of the University of Basel (Switzerland), first as an Associate Professor, and since 2015, as a Full Professor of Life Sciences Law and Intellectual Property Law. From 2014 to 2018, he held the position of Dean of Research. Since April 2019, he holds the chair of Civil Law, Technology and IT Law at the Humboldt University in Berlin. In addition, he is a director at the Weizenbaum Institute for the Networked Society. Among others, his current fields of research are patent law in the IT and the life sciences sector, ownership in data and other novel intangible assets, and liability for the use of AI.
